Statistics vary, but in general, around 35% of high school students will not go on to college after graduating, instead embarking on a variety of satisfying and interesting endeavors (Linda Lee, *Success Without College*, 2001). If your teen is one of these, use the high school years to formulate a plan that provides him with knowledge, abilities, and skills for whatever path he takes after graduation. The following guidelines can help:

- Begin at the end! Develop a high school program, including courses that are helpful to your teen's future goals. Refer to HSLDA's high school brochure, "Developing a Plan for High School." 
- Choose a variety of electives and extracurricular activities to round out your student's high school program.
- Keep records and create a transcript. See HSLDA's brochure, "Recordkeeping for High School." 
- Award a diploma and celebrate your teen's graduation.

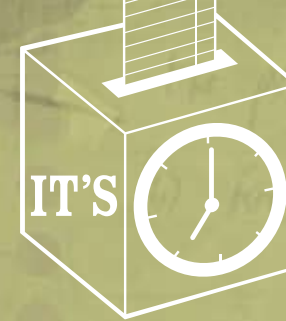

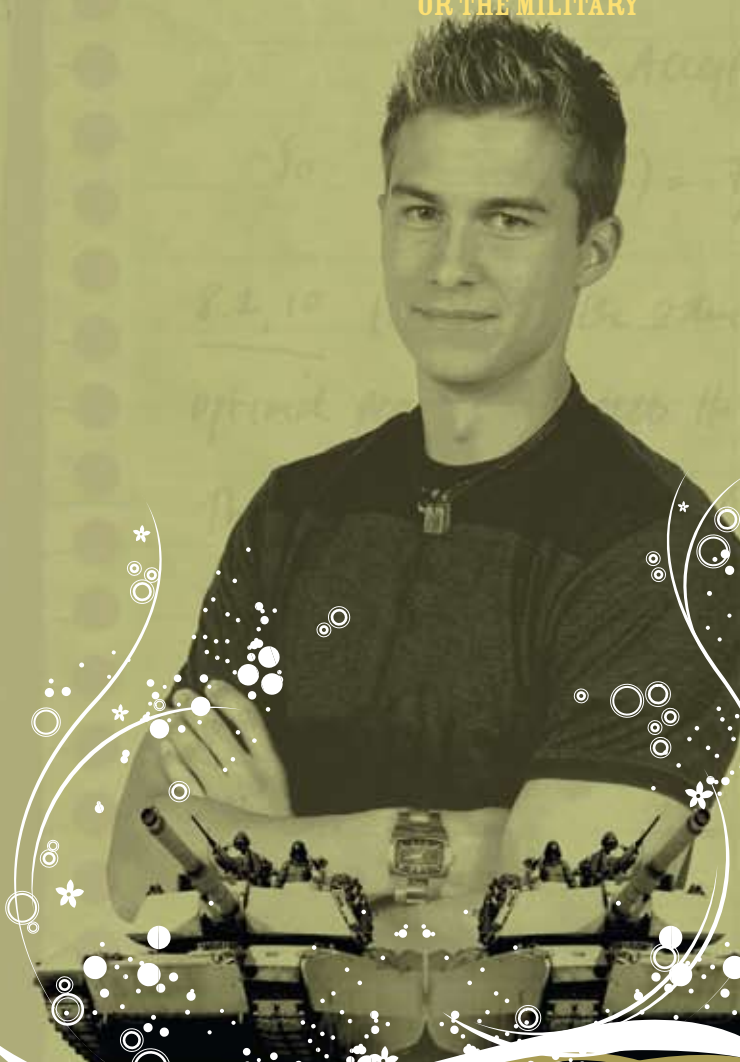

If your high schooler is planning to embark on a career in the marketplace following graduation, you'll need to help him lay out a comprehensive plan. Together with your student, explore the many different career categories, taking time to talk about your teen's strengths, weaknesses, and preferences to ascertain which careers might be most suitable. You may even want to look into career testing or counseling.

Examples of Career Categories

- Animal-related occupations
- Art and design
- Beauty and physical health
- Business and clerical
- Consulting and counseling
- Crafts and trades
- Entrepreneurial opportunities
- Food and drink industry
- Home maintenance/repair
- Legal/law enforcement
- Media and entertainment
- Medical/health
- Technology
- Travel/tourism

Career Training Considerations

- Is any certification or licensing required?
- Must accreditation be received from a professional organization, from a state, or from the training company?
- What internship/apprenticeship opportunities are available in this field?
- What is the long-term job outlook or advancement capacity of this career?

- Research the field.

These pursuits can last for a short season or develop into a lifetime endeavor. Some opportunities will be income-generating, while others will entail volunteer service. If your high schooler is interested in these types of pursuits, then plan to use the high school years to teach him or her the skills needed to succeed.

- Full-time ministry or mission work
- Caregiving position such as elder care/companion, doula, or hospice care
- Joining a family business
- Home management
- Childcare
- Public service

THE MILITARY

Enlisting in the military is a worthy and viable path and benefits all Americans by protecting our freedom. We applaud all homeschoolers who choose to serve our country and thank them for their dedication.

The Military's Homeschool Enlistment Policy

- Homeschoolers are enlisted as Tier 1 if they score 50 or above on the Armed Forces Qualifying Test.
- Homeschool enlistment documentation:
 - A high school diploma and transcript
 - Verification of compliance with any state homeschool statute
- HSLDA will assist its members as necessary.

Tier 1 Enlistment Benefits


Benefits vary among different branches of the military.

- Possible cash bonuses for enlistments of three or more years
- Eligible for promotions early in the process
- Access to the Army College Fund
- High score on the Armed Service Vocational Aptitude Battery Test may provide additional opportunities for training and additional job choices
- Monthly salary and 30 days leave per year

Prior to Enlisting

- Pursue a strong high school academic program.
- Participate in extracurricular activities: *sports, community/church involvement, skill building opportunities, overseas/cross-cultural experience.*
- Become an independent learner.
- Develop motivational skills, accept responsibility, cultivate respect for authority, and develop perseverance.
